
Pope St Gregory the Great - Tuesday 3rd September

Pope St Gregory the Great as born at Rome about the year 540. He entered the public service and was appointed a Prefect of the City. Then he entered a monastery, was ordained deacon and performed the office of a papal legate to Constantinople. On 3rd September 590 he became pope and showed himself a true pastor in his administration, his care of the poor and in spreading and consolidating the faith. In addition, he wrote many works on faith and morals. He died in 604.

Reflections on the Bible Readings on the 22nd Sunday of the Year



Today's readings explain that true religion is not simply a scrupulous, external observance of rules, laws, traditions, and rituals. It is, instead, a loving, obedient relationship with God. Prayers, rituals, Sacraments, and religious practices are our God-given graces to practice this true religion in our daily lives.

Deuteronomy 4:1-2. 6-8 - The first reading explains that religion is a Covenant relationship with a caring, providing, and protecting God. God gave Israel the Law so that the Israelites might keep their Covenant with Yahweh and thank Him for His love and fidelity to His Chosen People. The Law was also intended to keep them a united, holy, and intelligent nation, proud of their powerful, protective, single God.

The Responsorial Psalm describes a person who practices true religion — blameless and just, thoughtful, and honest in dealing with others.

St James 1:17-18. 21-22. 27 - In the second reading, St. James defines true religion as keeping the word of God and doing His will by helping the needy, the poor, and the weak in the community. He challenges Christians to become doers of the word, not merely hearers.

Mark 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23 - In today's Gospel, Jesus describes true religion as serving God and all His children with a pure and holy heart. He tells us that sincerity of heart, internal disposition, purity, and holiness are more important than mere external ritual observances. He also asks us to keep our hearts holy as it is the source of sins, vices, and evil habits.

We need to learn and keep the spirit of the Church's laws and ritual practices. For example, our Sunday obligation is intended to allow us to worship God in the parish community, to offer our lives to God, to ask His pardon for sins, to thank God for His blessings, and to receive Divine Life and strength from Him in Holy Communion.

Our daily family prayers are meant to thank God for His blessings, to present the family's needs before God, to ask pardon for our sins, to maintain the spirit of unity and love in the family, and to keep a close relationship with God.
