Prayer to Our Lady Help of Christians





St Augustine of Hippo – was born at Thagaste in Africa in the year 354. As a young man he led an unsettled life both in the philosophy he professed and in his moral behaviour, but later, in the year 387, he was converted and received baptism at Milan from the bishop, St Ambrose. He came back to his own country and led the life of an ascetic. Elected Bishop of Hippo, for thirty-four years he was an exemplary bishop to his flock, teaching his people by his sermons and writings, striving to combat the errors of the time and to make the faith understood. He died in the year 430.

Reflection on the Passion of St John the Baptist



On Tuesday of this week, we celebrate the memoria of what was once known as 'The Beheading of St John the Baptist but is now called the 'Passion of St John the Baptist'.

Passion can be understood in two ways; passion in terms of suffering, trial and death, and passion in terms of the motivating force and energy of someone for a particular purpose. The gospels make it clear that John fully understood his purpose in preparing the way for the coming Messiah, for Jesus.

As cousins, they may have known each other quite well in their childhood days and early years. John fulfilled his mission so well that his group of followers continued well after his death, although some, as we know, turned to Jesus. To die, the way he did at the hands of Herod, seems scant reward for all that he did for Jesus. Yet he would not have wanted it any other way. He offers us a somewhat brutal lesson as followers of Jesus whose mission, passion like John's, is to prepare the way for Jesus to enter the lives of those we encounter. Our reward may not be glorious, happy, or joyful in any way but, our reward, like John's, is to fulfil whatever God asks of us, however difficult, however challenging, and however impossible it may seem.

The main theme of today's readings is that Christian life is a series of daily choices for God or against God. As God's children, He has given us the freedom to choose. Let us make our choice for Christ and live it. In the first reading, having almost come to the end of his mission, Joshua reminded Israel of how faithful and pleasing the Lord has been to them. Finally, he challenged them: "If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve..." Their response was relatively rapid and positive: "We have no intention of deserting the Lord our God…"

Of course, as most of us do, they spoke well. Unfortunately, they did not keep their promise. As soon as Joshua was gone (Judges 1-12), they ran to other gods. The psalmist says: "Those who run to other gods multiply their sorrows" (Ps 16, 4). Indeed, they multiplied their sorrows through their own decision and choice.

The second reading emphasizes the unity that must exist in the Body of Christ and the intimate relationship between Jesus and His followers. It also challenges the Ephesian Christians to make the right choice in life and build Christian marriages on mutual respect and love, accepting each other's rights and dignity. Jesus also uses the husband-wife relationship as an analogy to explain the close relationship between Christ and the Church. Paul reminds us that Jesus nourishes us, the members of His Church, through the Eucharist, making us His own flesh and blood, as husband and wife become one flesh.

Concluding his long Eucharistic discourse, Jesus, in today's Gospel, challenges his Jewish audience, and later His apostles, to make their choice: to accept Him as the true Bread from Heaven Who gives them His Body and Blood as their Heavenly Food, or to join those who have lost their Faith in Jesus and left Him, expressing their confusion and doubts about His claims. Today's passage describes the various reactions of the people to Jesus' claims. Many of the disciples leave, but the apostles freely choose to stay with Jesus. In the Eucharistic celebration, we, too, are called to make a decision, profess our Faith in God's Son and renew the Covenant ratified in his Life, death and Resurrection.
