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

From Deacon Peter's desk... have you ever wondered what Deacon Peter does on his day off? Maybe not – after all it is not particularly important. However, I thought that I would share with you what I did last Wednesday – 5<sup>th</sup> February (Fr David's Birthday!). Some time ago, Fr David very kindly invited me to spend time with him at Allen Hall on his birthday – this seemed like a great opportunity to 'catch up with him & so I gratefully accepted. I arrived at Allen Hall shortly after 11am & saw Fr David standing on the pavement outside the Seminary cheerfully waving at me – I was, just for a moment, tempted to drive on but I resisted this and pulled over, parked my car & we warmly greeted each other. He was even more delighted when I

opened the boot & handed him two enormous boxes containing cakes – courtesy of Veronica. He could not wait to get inside & put the kettle on – we sat together enjoying our coffee & cake (especially the cake) – interestingly I was not offered another one! Shortly after this 'refreshment break' we went into the Seminary Chapel where Fr David celebrated Mass for the Feast of St Agnes. The congregation was made up of 30+ Seminarians who are at various stages of their training. I was particularly struck as to how prayerful the Mass was & how inspirational it was for me to be in the company of the seminarians – the Lord does indeed look after his Church. Please do keep the seminarians in your prayers. Later in the afternoon we spent time at a Spiritual Conversation with Fr Anthoiny Doe, the Spiritual Director at Allen Hall – a very informative and uplifting talk was given by Fr Anthony to which I felt most privileged to have been able to attend. We then joined the students for evening supper – which was delightful. As you can perhaps imagine, Fr David & I spent much time in conversation and banter – I was so fortunate to spend time with him on his 'special day.' He spoke so lovingly about his time in Olney and of you, the parishioners & indeed Fr Biju. Whilst he misses the parish enormously, he knows that he is doing the right thing by responding to God's call to help in the formation of the seminarians at Allen Hall – all of whom think the world of him as indeed do we all. He particularly asked me to send you his love and assurance of his prayers. I just wanted to share this with you all to assure you that Fr David is well and very happy to be at Allen Hall. As for my day off? I would not have wanted to spend it any other way!

### Fifth Sunday of the Year - Scripture Reflections

From Fr Biju's desk... The central theme of this Sunday's readings is God's call with people's response. The Scripture readings present three of the greatest witnesses in the Bible Isaiah, Paul, and Peter expressing their own worthlessness. A Seraph cleanses Isaiah's lips with burning coal, Paul experiences Jesus in a vision and then is cleansed after three days of fasting and prayer in physical blindness, and Jesus has a cleansing word for Peter. When Isaiah had his vision, Paul had his and its result, and Peter had his epiphany, each experienced deep humility, fear, respect, and reverence in short, awe of God.

In the First Reading, the Prophet Isaiah is called by God, but he looks at himself and says, "I am not worthy" and so, in response, God sends an angel to touch Isaiah's lips with a smoking-hot ember and tells him that God has now made him worthy. It is God's judgement to deem him worthy of the task he is being assigned, and it is not for Isaiah to second-guess his own usefulness to God.

**The Second Reading** describes the call of another great apostle, Paul, who judges himself to be unworthy of the name or the call as he was a former persecutor of the Christians. It was by giving these three men a strong conviction of their unworthiness and of their need for total dependence on His grace that God prepared them for their missions.

**The Gospel** illustrates the miraculous catch of fish. Jesus told Simon to fish in deep water. They caught so many fish that their nets almost broke. Simon, James, and John were amazed. Jesus said they would now catch people. They left everything to follow him.

The calls of these various ministers of God are set before us so that we can reassess our own call from God and our response to Him. The Second Vatican Council teaches that we are all called to ministry by virtue of our Baptism into Jesus Christ to the best of our ability and carry on the mission of the whole Christian people in the Church and the world.

It is important that we acknowledge our sinfulness. God, Who calls us and commissions us for His service, wants us to realize His presence everywhere and in everyone, to repent of our sins, and to remain in readiness to speak and act for Him in our life circumstances as He shall direct.
